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### **Abstract (12-point Times New Roman, bolded, justified)**

The body of your abstract begins here. It should be an explicit summary of your presentation that states the problem, the methods used, and the major results and conclusions. Do not include scientific symbols, acronyms, numbers, bullets or lists in the abstract. The abstract should be written **in 200 – 250 words** and with **10-point Times New Roman, justified and single line spacing**. The first part of your abstract should state the problem you set out to solve or the issue you set out to explore and explain your rationale for pursuing the project. The problem or issue might be a research question, a gap in critical attention to a text, a societal concern, etc. The purpose of your study is to solve this problem and/or add to your discipline's understanding of the issue. This section of the abstract should explain how you went about solving the problem or exploring the issue you identified. Your abstract should also describe the research methods; this section should include a concise description of the process by which you conducted your research. Next, your abstract should list the results or outcomes of the work you have done so far. If your project is not yet complete, you may still include preliminary results or your hypotheses about what those results will be. Finally, your abstract should close with a statement of the project's implications and contributions to its field. It should convince readers that the project is interesting, valuable, and worth investigating further. In particular, it should convince conference registrants to attend your presentation. Please make the page settings of your word processor to the **limit of 10 pages in A4 format** (21 x 29,7 cm or 8 x 11 inches); with the **margins: bottom 2.54 cm and top 3 cm, right/left margins must be 2.54 cm**. We recommend that you download these directions as a MS Word document and use it as the template for your abstract as it contains all necessary formats and styles. **We shall be able to publish your paper if the paper format and the margins are correct.**

*Keywords: Keywords regarding the work are stated in this section. Said section should contain a maximum of 5 words that are written with 10-point Times New Roman, italic and separated with a semi-colon.*

### **1. Introduction (12-point Times New Roman, bolded)**

All manuscripts must be **in English and Bahasa Malaysia only**, also the table and figure texts, otherwise, we cannot publish your paper. **If the manuscript is written in Bahasa Malaysia, it is compulsory to prepare an English abstract before Bahasa Malaysia's abstract.** It should be **single-spaced in 12-point Times New Roman and justified**.

Please keep the second copy of your manuscript in your office. We assume that the corresponding authors grant us the copyright to use the paper for the book or journal in question when receiving the paper. Should authors use tables or figures from other Publications, they must ask the corresponding publishers to grant them the right to publish this material in their paper.

Use italics for emphasizing a word or phrase. Do not use boldface typing or capital letters except for section headings (cf. remarks on section headings, below).

### **2. Organization of the Text**

#### **2.1 Section Headings (12-point Times New Roman, bolded, italic)**

The section headings are in **boldface** capital and lowercase letters. Second-level headings are typed as part of the succeeding paragraph (like the subsection heading of this paragraph).

## 2.2 Page Number

Do not number your paper.

## 2.3 Tables

Tables (refer to Table 1, Table 2, ...) should be presented as part of the text, but in such a way as to avoid confusion with the text. A descriptive title should be placed above each table. Units in tables should be given in square brackets [meV]. If square brackets are not available, use curly {meV} or standard brackets (meV).

## 2.4 Special Signs

For example,  $\alpha \gamma \mu \Omega () \geq \pm \bullet \Gamma \{11 \bar{2} 0\}$  should always be written in the fonts Times New Roman, especially also in the figures and tables.

## 2.5 Macros

Do not use any macros for the figures and tables. (We will not be able to convert such papers into our system).

## 2.6 Language

All text, figures and tables must be in English/Bahasa.

## 2.7 Equations

Equations (refer with: Eq. 1, Eq. 2, ...) should be indented 5 mm (0.2"). There should be one line of space above the equation and one line of space below it before the text continues. The equations have to be numbered sequentially, and the number is put in parentheses at the right-hand edge of the text. Equations should be punctuated as if they were an ordinary part of the text. Punctuation appears after the equation but before the equation number, e.g.

$$c^2 = a^2 + b^2. \quad (1)$$

## 2.8 Figures

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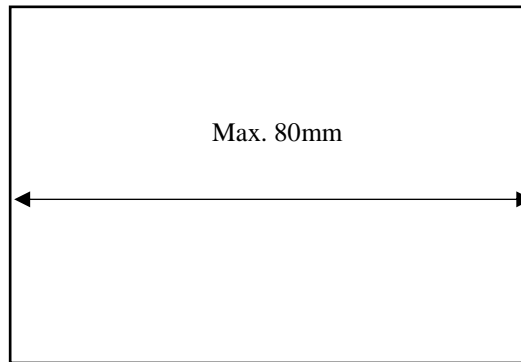


Fig. 1. Example of figure (*10-point Times New Roman, centred*)

Figures (refer to Fig. 1, Fig. 2, ...) also should be presented as part of the text, leaving enough space so that the captions will not be confused with the text. The caption should be self-contained and placed *below or beside* the figure. Generally, only original drawings or photographic reproductions are acceptable. Only very good photocopies are acceptable. Utmost

care must be taken to *insert the figures in correct alignment with the text*. Half-tone pictures should be in the form of glossy prints.
